A SPECIAL MARKING OF TIME

Those new to the Congregational way might think that we are trapped living in the past. A visitor once told me, "It looks like you worship the Pilgrims!" Our worship space is called the Meeting House. Our Adult Education discussion is Mayflower Café. Our youth group is Pilgrim Fellowship. Many of our sister churches carry names like Mayflower, Plymouth, and Pilgrim Congregational Church. But we are proud of our spiritual and historic ancestors and this time of year it is most appropriate and perhaps necessary to reflect upon their achievements and their gifts to us.

We are about to commemorate the 400th anniversary of the Pilgrims landing in Plymouth, Massachusetts. Plans are being made to observe the historical date with anniversary events in New England. The National Association of Congregational Christian Churches is meeting in Portland, ME next summer, as close as we could find available space and reasonably priced hotel rooms to Plymouth. A special team called Plymouth 400 and the Congregational Library is publishing education materials and information that will remind us of the significance of 400 years of Congregationalism in America. You will see some of their work in our bulletins and in our Mayflower Café gatherings next spring. The emphasis is that marking of time is not just an observance of history but an impetus to understand our modern identity.

- What does it mean to be a Congregationalist? Here are some talking points, courtesy of Plymouth 400: The Pilgrims were different from other Reformers in their view of the power and authority within the church. Pilgrims or Separatists believed that the local church could and should exercise all powers that Christ gave to the Church. They believed in church governance by church members, submitting to God's will through prayer and Scripture.
 - The Pilgrims were also unique in that they saw each church gathered as a company of believers living in covenant with one another, under God. There was no statement of faith or creed to which individual members must submit.
 - The Pilgrims unique approach to church governance offered a workable pattern for self-government. The Mayflower Compact was the first document to establish a civil government in America in the absence of immediate royal authority. The Congregational Way influenced the government of the American colonies and ultimately inspired the American Revolution.
 - Although early Congregationalists were Calvinist in theology, today's Congregationalists hold a wide variety of theological views. We take such diversity to be a strength. We listen respectfully to one another and believe that the Holy Spirit speaks to us even through those with whom we disagree.
 - Congregationalists were and are proponents of a well-educated clergy and laity, founding colleges such as Harvard and Yale, Oberlin, and Michigan's own Olivet College.
 - And finally, if you need to mention some well-known Congregationalists, try these William Bradford, Jonathan Edwards, John Adams, Abigail Adams, John Quincy Adams, Harriet Beecher Stowe, Antoinette Brown (the first woman ordained to Christian ministry in the US), Katharine Lee Bates, Washington Gladden, Calvin Coolidge, and Lloyd Douglas.

This November and beyond we can proudly celebrate our Pilgrim heritage, not simply as history lovers but as those who wish to carry a proud and important movement into the future.

FAIR SHARE




