TESTING IN AN EVERYDAY WILDERNESS

Soon after I was ordained and had received my first call to serve the First Congregational Church in Toulon, IL, I ordered a bunch of books for my office. In those days, before the internet and helpful websites, books were the major resource for study, for inspiration, and for sermon resources. One of the very first books that I purchased was titled *An Everyday God: Insights from the Ordinary*. It was written by James Taylor, a Canadian minister and author. In my first couple of years of ministry I used that book countless times for personal devotions and for an occasional sermon illustration. Then for whatever reason I forgot about it and it got lost on my bookshelf.

A few years ago, while sitting in my office here at Meadowbrook, I remembered the value I had received in the book and began searching for it with great intensity. Sadly, I could not find it anywhere. Perhaps I had thrown it away in one of my cleaning binges preceding my move to Salt Lake City or here to Novi. Maybe I had given the book to a friend or a church member to use for devotions, and never thought to get it back. Nevertheless, it isn't there. I haven't yet looked to see if I can purchase another copy.

One of the stories from the book that I remember is about a person who was torn in the making of a difficult decision. A friend suggested that she flip a coin to make the tough choice. She did. The friend then asked, "How did you feel the moment you saw the choice the coin had made for you?" The woman responded, "I was disappointed." Her friend then said, "Then you know that the choice is wrong. Disregard it and do what is right."

What is it that tells us what is right and what is wrong? James Taylor writes that we all have a strange feeling of occasionally being aliens in a world that has gotten out of control. Something tells us that we were meant for better things than the selfishness, the lies, and the brokenness we encounter. Taylor adds that we don't understand how we got there. We don't see where we are going when we make the compromises, the simple flirtations, the choices based purely on our bank accounts, and priorities of our time. But when the coin is flipped, we know that our choices are wrong. We feel separated from something. And that sudden alienation from the world is evidence that there is a God and that God is speaking something to us.

We are approaching the season of Lent which begins with the story of Jesus being tested in the wilderness. Jesus knew that the choices that Satan presented to him held desirable options yet ones which would separate him from God. The power of conscience, the power of God's voice speaking clearly to him was especially evident in that wilderness.

As we look forward to the introspective season, may we find ways to hear the voice that speaks to our alienation. May we find discipline that reminds us of call to return home to who we were created to be. In our difficult choices of wilderness, may we begin to know more clearly what it is that God desires and what choices we can make to be part of that desire.


Youth Retreat


We are always in need of hosts for Fellowship Hour and would certainly like peo-




LENTEN DEVOTIONALS
